Through strong partnerships with industry leaders and post-secondary institutions, the WFC team is helping students achieve their educational and career aspirations.

Empowering Youth Through Skills and Certifications

The WFC team's dedication has resulted in remarkable achievements. Recently, they assisted students in earning their Commercial Driver's Licenses (CDLs) and driver's licenses, equipping them with vital skills and certifications to secure meaningful employment. One such success story is Jasmin, a committed WFC participant who successfully completed her Driver's Education course and obtained her driver's license – a significant step toward gaining independence and enhancing her career prospects.

WFC students are also giving back to the community. In November, participants actively volunteered in United Way's Day of Action, demonstrating their commitment to service. Additionally, students recently attended Gadsden State's Preview Day, where they explored academic and career pathways, gaining valuable insights into their post-secondary options.

Impact in Numbers

The program's impact is reflected in the outstanding outcomes achieved over the past two years:

2023-2024 Year

- · 33 active students and 24 follow-up students
- · Among WFC's active students:
 - · 31 graduated high school
 - •1 earned a certification credential
 - 19 gained employment
 - 13 enrolled in post-secondary education
 - · 6 lost to follow-up
 - · Among follow-up students:
 - 1 obtained their GED
 - 12 gained employment
 - 6 enrolled in post-secondary education
 - 10 unknown employment/postsecondary status due to loss of contact

2025 Year (So Far)

- · Actively serving 39 students in Phase 1 and 34 students in Phase 2
- 7 follow-up students have enrolled in post-secondary education
- · Nearly 20 participants have already gained employment
